Surveying students on pornography use and involving them in planning critical learning interventions

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
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

The purpose of this study was to gain insight into pornography engagement patterns among Irish university students. A total of 1,934 students from the National University of Ireland, Galway completed an anonymous online survey. The majority of participants were female (51%), 47% were male, 1% identified as gender queer or non-binary, 0.5% as transgender and the remaining 0.4% identified as 'other'. The majority (78%) were 18-25 years of age, identified as heterosexual (85%) and Irish (80%).







<sup>\*</sup>Porn is defined as video footage, including movies or video clips of people having sex or engaging in other sexual behaviours that is designed to sexually arouse the viewer

### Why do you watch porn?

For Masturbation?	For Information?	Out of Curiosity?	With a Partner for Arousal?
Just over <b>60% of students</b> use porn for masturbation regularly. <b>15% of students</b> never use it.	49.4% of students wouldn't refer to porn for information about sex, with only 2.5% of students referencing it 'a great deal'.	25% of students watch porn 'somewhat' out of curiousity, while 23% of students would 'not at all' be curious to watch.	Less than 5% of students watch porn regularly with their partner for arousal, compared to 74% of students who wouldn't at all.

#### Attitudes toward porn

Relationship Impact?	Is Porn Realistic?	Fun to watch?
21% said that they have used porn with their partner for new sexual ideas.	Men and women agree porn is not realistic; <b>84% of men &amp; 91% of women</b> disagree with the idea that porn portrays sex in a realistic way.	Two thirds of men believe porn is fun and exciting to watch, compared to 37% of women.


### Qualitative Research

The qualitative data here sought to explore students attitudes and beliefs about porn.

Group discussion with students showed an awareness that some scenarios reflect sexual assault:



The negative impact of watching porn scenes where 'no' is ignored



Many discussed how porn can help in exploring sexual interests and identity:

That you know it's a safe enough place to explore your fantasies or you know your sexual orientation or your interests, whatever

For a lot of gay people anyway it's used very much as a common tool for people to eh, to figure out their sexual orientation, because at that age it is confusing, so I suppose, porn is a go-to medium for people to find out what they're reacting to sexually

Students provided suggestions for breaking myths promoted through porn:

You could present like myth and fact, and like short YouTube videos or a Snapchat that you could follow. And be like 'myth' about penis size, or something like that, and then 'fact': 'most penises are this size' or most sexual interactions will last this long on average


These findings came from a series of participatory workshops with 54 university students. The illustration was produced by participants who presented recommendations on what could be done to promote critical awareness of pornography.
